HIS PROBLEM	Although the creature was described in later works as a composite of whole body parts grafted together from cadavers and reanimated by the use of electricity, this description is not consistent with Shelley's work; both the use of electricity and the cobbled-together image of Frankenstein's monster were more the result of James Whale's popular 1931 film adaptation of the story, and other early motion-picture works based upon the creature.	Quasimodo was a hunchbacked, twisted-faced child who was abandoned shortly after being born near the Cathedral of Our Lady of Paris, and lived in Notre Dame Cathedral, ringing the bells. He could only use one eye, since the other could use it. had almost blocked by the deformity of his face	The size of his head increased to 3 feet (almost 1 meter) in circumference, with spongy skin hanging from the back of his head and across his face; deformation of the jaws rendered him incapable of showing facial expression or speaking clearly.
COULD HE BE HAPPY?	Not really	Finally yes	He was happy with her mother, but when she dies, he became to feel sad again.
HOW DID HIS LIFE END?	He took his own life, because he felt bad about the things that he did.	Quasimodo escapes from Notre Dame after Esmeralda's death. About three years later Quasimodo's lifeless body is found, which has rotted into a skeleton, joined to Esmeralda's skeleton in an embrace but as his corpse is thrown out of the Esmeralda, both of them crumble to dust.	On the morning of April 11, 1890, at the age of 27, Joseph Carey Merrick was found dead in his bed, he was suffocated
